SID: You're going to learn how someone who had severe asthma, who was anorexic, suicidal, and after her encounter with the love of God, not only was she healed, but she teaches people how to experience the full manifest presence of the Glory of God, 24/7.

Is there a supernatural dimension, a world beyond the one we know? Is there life after death? Do angels exist? Can our dreams contain messages from Heaven? Can we tap into ancient secrets of the supernatural? Are healing miracles real? Sid Roth has spent over 35 years researching the strange world of the supernatural. Join Sid for this edition of **It's Supernatural**.

SID: Hello. Sid Roth here. Welcome to my world where it's naturally supernatural. We have had a revelation of the Messiah, and even an emphasis, if you will, and we will between now and the time the Messiah returns. We've had an emphasis of the Holy Spirit, and we will between now and the time that the Messiah returns. But right now, we're coming into the last of the last days, and just before the Messiah returns there is going to be a major revelation of the love of God, a major revelation of the holiness of God, a major revelation of the majesty of Father God. And I could not have picked someone better to give you that revelation as God did. God picked my guest, A.J. Jones, because you think you have a bad situation in your life. Your mother, your father were abusive. You had nothing compared to A.J. At age three, I can't believe it, your father who was an alcoholic pushed you down the stairs. Tell me about that.

A.J.: He actually threw a chair. So he threw a chair at me.

SID: That was even worse.

A.J.: A kitchen chair. He threw a kitchen chair and it knocked me down the stairs.

SID: In fact, it got so bad, A.J., that your mother put a lock inside your closet door so you could be safe.

A.J.: Yeah. I would hide in my closet. I had all my stuffed animals in there. So when they would be fighting I would hide in my closet to just try and get away from the noise, and try and feel safe for a bit.

SID: She was anorexic, suicidal, and she had such severe asthma that by the time she was 18 years of age, she had been in the hospital 400 times. Are you stretching it? I mean, that's a lot.

A.J.: No, it was a lot. I had asthma attacks all the time, every week. I had to carry a nebulizer, like a little machine with me wherever I would go. My mom used to wake me up every morning and give me this stuff that would make me throw up the stuff out of my lungs so I could get to noon without having to go to the hospital.

SID: When you were 13, your parents were getting a divorce, and your mother assured you your father would not be there. You wanted to go home to get your clothes. What happened?

A.J.: Mom had said he wouldn't be there and I never had to see him again, and I didn't want to. And I went home and there was my dad sitting there in the kitchen. The whole divorce had gone down because I had told my grandmother what was happening in our house. When I walked in I was kind of shocked to see him. He looked at me and he said, "How can you do this me? I love you." And I remember just saying back to him, "You have a very strange way of showing it and you need to know that I hate you, and I hope you die." And I took off. I was a very angry child.

SID: When he would send you gifts, what would you do with them?

A.J.: I would smash them up into little tiny pieces and mail them back. I was very, very angry. I had a whole bunch of issues. So yeah, I would send them back to him. And he sent flowers twice. And the first time I waited for them die and I mailed them back, and a second time that took too long. So I cut them up and poured Drano over them, which has a very interesting effect, and mailed them back. Some small issues there.

SID: You were just hurt so bad by him that you wanted to hurt him.

A.J.: Yes. I wanted him to know that he was never coming back into my life ever.

SID: Okay. You're 15. You have an argument with your sister. It's her birthday. And to pay her back, you go to a Christian meeting, and you hear for the first time in your life about the love of God, and you become born from above. When your father was dying, your mother came to get you to bring you to the hospital. Tell me about that circumstance.

A.J.: So that was maybe about six months after I first met Jesus, and I was starting to go to church. The Lord had been talking to me about forgiving and my answer was just no, he doesn't deserve it. Then my dad ends up in the hospital and my mom comes to get me from an exam and just says, "Hey, you need to come with me right now." And I was like, "I don't want to go." I actually said to her, "I said good-bye a year and a half ago. Let him die." And we ended up going to the hospital. And in the hospital, the doctor came out and said, "We're going to move him to the ICU, but as we're getting things ready we're going to let one of you come in and see him," because the whole family was kind of waiting out there. And I wasn't one of his favorite kids. There were very specific favorites, and I found out I wasn't one of those. And so I didn't expect to be the one that was asked to go in. But the doctor came and said, "He said he'd like to see Alison." And I said, "I don't want to see him." But then my mother started yelling at me. So I was like, okay, escape. And I went in to see my dad. So the doctor could tell I was nervous because I was shaking. And he waited beside the curtain. And I went in and my dad was all bandaged up and stuff, and lying there. He opened up his hand and he said, "One more chance." And I said, "No."

SID: How could you do that? Did you know he was dying?

A.J.: Yes. I was so angry, Sid. I was so angry, and I was so hurt and afraid. My father had always been someone I was afraid of, not somebody that was safe. So I was just like, no, I'm done. I was done a while ago. So I said, "I can't do that." I walked outside of the curtain and the doctor stopped me and he said, "You're father is not going to live through the night. So why don't you just let him die thinking he has one more chance." So I thought about it for a second. I thought, fine, and I went in. And I wish I could say I looked at him with kindness, but I didn't. And I just said, "You have one more chance. Did you hear me? One more." And I took off.

SID: Why was your father in the hospital in the first place?

A.J.: He had had a discussion with my sister about how to get back into my life. And my sister had said, "Unless you stop drinking she's not ever gonna go there." And so he did. He stopped cold turkey. But he had been drinking an excessive amount of alcohol for many, many years. So basically two days later, he had a massive seizure at the top of 92 stairs that go down into a parking garage. So he had this seizure and fell down these stairs. Somebody found him unconscious. There was all kinds of internal bleeding and that kind of stuff, which was why he was in the hospital.

SID: So he wanted to stop drinking for you.

A.J.: Yeah. But I didn't know that's why I was there.

SID: But he's going to die in a few days. So she figures, I'll just leave him at peace and say, "I'll give him one more chance," because he'll be dead in a couple of days. That's not what happened. Don't go away. We'll be back right.

SID: Hello. Sid Roth here with A.J. Jones. Can you imagine the circumstances that she was in? Her father is dying in the hospital. She hates him with every fiber of her being. She doesn't want anything to do with him. But he's going to die in a few days. So the doctor says, "Tell him you'll give him another chance." So she says, "Okay, Dad, I'll give you another chance." She couldn't even face him. She just ran out after that. But a miracle occurred. He lived. And then what happened? A greater miracle occurred with you.

A.J.: Basically for the next four years, God completely restored our relationship. I mean, restored is sort of an understatement because we didn't have a relationship before. So all of a sudden we have one. But my dad literally became like my best friend, and we just did everything

together. I ended up moving in with my dad. And we just had so much fun. My best friend in high school called my dad my other best friend. So it was amazing. It was really cool.

SID: And what happened next should never have happened. After this restoration, another betrayal, maybe even worse. Her father commits suicide and it put her in a tailspin. And A.J. decides to commit suicide. Why did you stop?

A.J.: I stopped because I literally heard the audible voice of God in the room that I was in. So I was trying to clean up after my dad's suicide. We couldn't pay anybody to clean up the mess. And so there I was cleaning it up. And I had a whole bunch of pills, and I thought, this time I'm going to make sure it works. So I was holding them and I heard an audible voice in the sunroom that I was in that said, "No. I love you." And it was so loud. But it was gentle, but it was loud. And I knew I was alone in the apartment. So I ended up dropping the pills into the blood, and I just sort of stood there shaking. I ended up not, I didn't want to pick them out of the blood, obviously. And my mom came in about half an hour later, and I hadn't done it.

SID: If you hadn't heard that audible voice, you would have been dead.

A.J.: I would have died, yeah.

SID: And then it wasn't your style, but you go to a church called The Airport Church. Pastor John Arnott is speaking. You walk into the church. What happens?

A.J.: Well I walked into the church with a really bad attitude because I got hijacked and brought there. As you say, not my style.

SID: You know, a friend just hijacked you.

A.J.: Yes, literally. She was the one that drove and she said, "We're going here this time." And I was like, "But I don't want to." And she said, "I don't care."

SID: Why didn't you want to?

A.J.: Because I was literally planning my own demise. I was like, I'm going to make sure this time when I kill myself...

SID: Even with the voice of God.

A.J.: Yeah, because I hadn't dealt with any of my issues in the background. So I still had the same amount of pain. So the plan was still sort of there. Anyway, we walked into the building. And the worship leader gets up and he starts singing this old Vineyard song called, "Father, I Want You to Hold Me." And about 30 seconds and I realize I'm hearing this horrendous noise. And it probably took me another 30 seconds to realize I was making the horrendous noise. I mean, I just was wailing and wailing. Like something was uncapped because of the presence of God in that place, and I just couldn't keep it in any longer. So it was pretty intense.

SID: And then John Arnot had a word that was just for you. What was it?

A.J.: It's really funny. He came to the end of his sermon, and he said, "There's somebody that needs to know that Daddy loves them." And now I think, could it be the girl losing it in the back. I was like, how does he know? And I remember in my head thinking, I am not going up there. There are 60 people watching me. But my body was, we're going. And I ended up walking up to the front. And John opened up his arms and I walked into his arms, and I cried all over him for about 40 minutes. He ended up having to close up the meeting and holding me up, and closing up the church service because I fell apart. But it was the beginning of something wonderful.

SID: What was going on when you heard that song and then these arms around you. And if you don't know John, he's a big guy and he has these big arms. I can picture his big arms around A.J. What's going on inside of you, A.J.?

A.J.: I think I felt loved again. I had been so alone. And even though I had had a relationship with the Lord for about four years, I didn't know how to pray. I didn't know how to hear His voice. I still felt alone. And in that moment I didn't feel alone any more. I knew that somebody loved me, and it felt to me like, okay, it's going to be okay. I'm going to make it through this. So it was pretty, it changed everything.

SID: Speaking of changing, first of all, she literally had a download from Heaven of a revelation of the love of God the Father that I want you to have. I want her to mentor you in this. But she no longer had any desire to be suicidal, did you?

A.J.: Oh no. A couple of months later there was a meeting where a person picked me out and prophesied over me, and told me about God's love for me and His plan for my life. He didn't even pray about suicide or anything like that. He just prayed over me, and the Holy Spirit came on me, and I felt that love again, and from that moment I never struggled with suicide.

SID: What about anorexia?

A.J.: All gone from that moment.

SID: And God then had mercy and took away that severe asthma, where you were in the hospital 400 times before she was 18 years of age. I want you to capture, because this is a presence that's going to come on you and change your life forever, because she has had such a revelation of God the Father. And that's where we are right now. We're in the last of the last days, and I want you to feel as loved as A.J. feels. You know why? Because God does love you that much. That's why you're watching right now. Some of you, you've had abusive situations in your home and others, your father and mother, they were fine. But compared to the love of God, they weren't so fine. I want you to experience the pure authentic love of God. Don't go away. We'll be right back.

SID: I believe that you're going to get such a download of the love of Father God. It's so pure. It's so wonderful. A.J., you told me that last night God began to speak to you about what you're supposed to tell those that are watching right now. Would you do that?

A.J.: What you feel about God, what you think about God is what will actually define how you receive and everything you receive from God, how you respond to life, how you're able to overcome circumstances, because your view of God determines your ability to do those things. And so often we find that in our lives our view of God is actually, it's been overshadowed by our own authority figures. So our own experiences with our fathers or our mothers have defined in our minds how God is. And so if we've had an abusive father or an angry father we think God is angry, and then we respond to God like that. And God is really not like that all. And so if we can actually get to know the Father as He is, then we actually get to live like we're loved and it changes everything, I mean, absolutely everything.

SID: What is the difference between an orphan and a son?

A.J.: Orphans tend to strive and they compete, and they have to be the most impressive person in the room. They have to be the guy to be able to feel good about themselves. Does that make sense? A son can actually just know that they're loved. And even when things don't go perfect, and if everything were to go wrong on this show, I'm still loved. I'm still okay and everything is still good.

SID: It's a contentment.

A.J.: It's awesome. It's a fullness. And if you're living from that place then you don't get blown over by everything.

SID: You know, I keep thinking about this. Just as God talked to you about what to say on this show, that song, "Father, I Want You to Hold Me," I want to take you back to that moment when you heard that song, and what happened to you when you heard that song? What did you experience on the inside?

A.J.: An unlocking. It was so hard to explain. I didn't even realize it was happening when it started. But God uncapped so much pain and just started really removing buckets full of pain in my life.

SID: Here's what I know. This is what I know, A.J. If you would look into the camera and sing to that person watching, that song, just a little bit of it, the same thing is going to happen to them. Would you do that now?

A.J.: Okay. [singing] Father, I want you to hold me. I want to rest in your arms today. Father, I know you will show me how much you care for me in every way.

SID: I'll tell you what, A.J., there's a man that's in Heaven who used to say, "Something good is going to happen to you." I'm going to change it. Something good has happened to you. A.J. now, because she feels so secure in who she is, she's no longer an orphan. She is a daughter of the Living God, at peace, no matter what happens, whatever is thrown at her. She's even had visitations and visions of Heaven. Tell me about some of your visions of Heaven.

A.J.: Probably the first vision I had of Heaven, an angel was giving me a tour. He was showing me different places like a war room and a library where there's books that are recorded. Our lives are being recorded.

SID: So in other words, everything you've ever done is in that book, and the bad things, they're not in that book if you've repented and believe that the blood of Jesus was a great eradicator and eradicated it all, because this is what God says. If you confess your sins, He's just faithful to forgive you of all of your sins. Now you saw angels communicating. What were they doing?

A.J.: We walked out and we saw this huge banquet table. And I don't even know if I could describe the length of it, hundreds and hundreds, and hundreds of meters long. In the first vision they were just putting the stuff down that makes it look pretty, you know, like the little arrangements and stuff. The second time, there was much more already on the table. Like there was already glasses and things like that. And I remember thinking, we're getting there. Things are moving quickly.

SID: I know no one knows the day or hour, but we can know the season. Would you say we're in the season of his return, from what you saw?

A.J.: I certainly think that we're in the last days. I don't know if I even fully know what that means. But I feel an excitement that things are being made ready.

SID: I feel an excitement about you. Many of you have never had your father, your earthly father bless you. Can I bless you right now? A blessing that was given to Moses, and this is what Moses was told. If you will pray this blessing over the Jewish people, my name is going to be on it. And as of this moment if you have repented of your sins and made Jesus your Lord, if you haven't, do it right now. I'm going to pray this ancient Jewish blessing over you. It's going to change you forever. And I'm going to change the terminology because the blessing was before Jesus came. Now we're looking back at the cross. The Lord has blessed you. The Lord has kept you. The Lord, He smiled over you. The Lord has gifted you. The Lord has already surrounded you with His favor. And the Lord has given you his shalom. That's His peace in Hebrew. The word "shalom" means completeness. The Lord has given you His completeness. You realize what that means? If God is for you, who could be against you? Don't look at that temporary. Look at the eternal. He's given you His completeness in your spirit, in your soul and in your body in the name that you're sealed with right now, the name of Yeshua. Can you feel that flow? Yeshua [Hebrew]. Jesus the Messiah, our righteousness. And I seal that prayer in Jesus' name. You are a son, you are a daughter of the Living God.
